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

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

Like Jacksonville itself, our downtown is a sprawling area. But the city and Downtown Vision, Inc. have smartly narrowed their development, focusing on the walkable core before branching out. This urban core has grown and improved in the past two years. New bars, new businesses, expansions, events, new cityscaping and maintenance are all part of the positive changes EU is covering in our Downtown issue.

DOWNTOWN IMPROVEMENTS By Erin Thursby

Downtown Vision, Inc. has worked with a lot of individuals, organizations and businesses to make Downtown a better place to live work and play. In the past year they've been the driving force behind many improvements, keeping the city center vibrant.

"Downtown Jacksonville, the heart of our city, continues to make progress despite historic economic challenges," says Pamela Elms, Director of Marketing at DVI.

A pedestrian friendly Downtown has been one of the things DVI has pushed for. The city is now working on improving that on Laura and Bay Street. Better signage, historical plaques, directional kiosks and cobblestone pavers are some of the things they'll be installing.

Mayor Peyton was quoted on coj.net as saying: "We believe this public realm initiative will pay for itself in economic growth in downtown Jacksonville by attracting more capital investment and encouraging workers, residents and visitors to locate in this great area."

Other slated Downtown facelifts include the revamping of Friendship Fountain (improving the antiquated pump system, pulling out the concrete in favor of lawn and park amenities), updating the Southbank Riverwalk and Metropolitan Park.

Beyond these larger-scale, city projects, Downtown Vision, Inc. has had a more direct hand in smaller, urban core improvement.

Knowing that perceived safety was also a Downtown issue, DVI has opened up dialogues with the Sheriff for more police presence. The Downtown Ambassadors also provide a measure of safety and security, filling the gaps the police can't always cover. Maintaining good lighting and system of reporting broken or spent street lights are also part of heightening Downtown security.

Clean, well-maintained sidewalks are part of Downtown Vision's effort to boost the perception of the area. This year, they turned over management of both the Downtown Ambassadors and the Downtown Clean Team Programs to Service Group, Inc.

"For eight years we managed the program in-house, and yet we still needed to do more," says Terry Lorince, Executive Director of DVI.

To that end, they turned things over to SGI, a company that has managed clean and safe programs in other cities. This move has made it possible for the Ambassadors to pick up trash as they patrol the sidewalks, something that insurance liabilities didn't allow them to do in the past.


In addition to these small maintenance jobs, new, green cleaning equipment has also been requisitioned. The HydroTek T-220 is a pressure washer that can remove gum from the sidewalk. Other pressure washers and even an outdoor vacuum make walking Downtown more pleasant. The streets in the core are noticeably cleaner and better maintained than they were a year ago.

"Having a clean Downtown is step one in Downtown revitalization. It shows we take pride in Jacksonville and we care about this neighborhood," says Lorince.

Cleaning isn't the only thing DVI has done in the past year to keep up the appearance of Downtown. A few blocks of Forsyth, Adams and Ocean Street were all part of a Great Streets demonstration. Businesses paid for 60 hanging flower baskets in the grid (which the Ambassador teams water daily) and DVI mulched tree beds, wrapped parking meters and enlisted AIGA artists to paint a mural.

But it hasn't been the working storefronts that have been a problem. Business owners want to improve Downtown. What casts a shadow over them are the empty storefronts and ill-kept spaces. So DVI started engaging law enforcement to crack down on absentee property owners who had code violations. They also started working to spruce up empty storefronts with more cooperative landlords.

And they found a better use for them. Rather than letting them lie fallow, they began

SMALL SUCCESSES

Downtown Revitalized One Business at a Time **BY ERIN THURSBY**

Downtown is home to too many empty storefronts, but there are success stories- places that opened a couple of years ago and have weathered the bad economy, existing restaurants that have expanded and new businesses that opened their doors just last year. It's these small undertakings that make a difference and open the door for larger scale Downtown improvement.

Says Pamela Elms, Director of Marketing for Downtown Vision, "It's not [always] the big projects that revitalize Downtown. It's the small entrepreneurs."

Chamblin's Uptown (215 N. Laura St., 674-0868) opened its doors in 2008, celebrating its second birthday this year. This two story bookstore and cafe is unique to the area. In some ways it's similar to his Lakeshore/Ortega area store off of Roosevelt, which also does a bustling trade in used books, but unlike that store, they serve coffee (Green Mountain), soups, sandwiches, salads and ice cream snacks at the Downtown locale.

Owner Ron Chamblin says that the Downtown storefront has "shown a steady increase" since opening. He hopes as other shops move into the area, the synergy created will continue to boost his sales.

partnering artists with property owners. The artists display works during Art Walk or open studios in these spaces, and the owners get to show off the space, hopefully attracting renters while helping the downtown and art community.

Perception isn't the only thing DVI focuses on, though perception is a factor of some of their more tangible goals. The bottom line of development is the need for more warm bodies in Downtown for more than just one-time events, both in offices and living spaces. That's what DVI is always working toward and what Downtown aspires to do. The changes of the past year, and the changes to come are steps in that direction.

Businesses such as Chamblin's that already have roots, both financially and in the community, can be a bedrock for Downtown. They already have a customer base, a reputation and time to make their business grow.

Another business with roots in the community opened Downtown late in 2009, an office furnishing and décor shop called Perdue (5 West Forsyth St, 737-5858). The firm itself has an established rep in Jacksonville. They've been around since 1916 and have past clients such as St. Vincent's Hospital, UNF, Vystar, Wachovia and several local law offices.


Expansion of existing businesses can be just as important to the health of Downtown as new storefronts. Zodiac Grill, which has had success in the Downtown area, is moving its digs from 128 W. Adams Street to 118 W. Adams Street.

"When a business moves from one place to another within Downtown, it's good for us because they've improved and renovated the old space, making it more attractive to new renters," says Pamela Elms of Downtown Vision.

Expansions aren't always physical. Longer hours (particularly on Art Walk nights) and expanded

services are all part of that improvement. See article Faster Food to the right for new food delivery options of existing restaurants. The Skyline Cafe (50 N Laura St., Bank of America building, 42 floor, 791-9533 x241) is now open Wednesday and Friday from 4:30 pm to 7:30 pm for cocktails, beer, wine and snacks. Chew (117 West Adams St., 355-3793) has also recently added a Happy Hour.

Downtown workers need to eat, so there are plenty of places to lunch in the Downtown area (though most tend to be closed on weekends and in the evenings). Despite, or maybe because of, the down economy, well-located delis have done decent business. Several delis that opened in '08 that are still part of the Downtown landscape: Adams St. Deli (126 West Adams St., 475-1400), Akel's Deli and the Brick Coffee House (214 North Hogan St., 354-9945). This Brick, by the way, is not affiliated with the Avondale eatery of the same name.

The Landing has seen various openings in the restaurant department in the past year; Cinco de Mayo, Village Bread and Chicago Pizza all opened in 2009. Restaurants have come and gone in these spaces, so it's hard to tell what what will remain.

On the Southbank there's more than one restaurant that's kept things cooking since '08, Basil Thai & Sushi (1004 Hendricks Ave., 674-0190) and Sake House (1478 Riverplace Blvd., 306-2188) at Riverplace South.

Downtown also has particular services that can be difficult to find elsewhere, some of which have opened in the past two years.

Ortho Shoe Service (223 Hogan St. N. 301-1424) is a classic shoe repair shop. Rows of well-loved shoes given a second life with repairs line the shelves of the store, waiting for their owners to welcome them home again. Despite their old-school look, they also handle foot care, via computer

generated insoles. They make plaster molds of your feet that are then scanned to create your custom insole. Customers with back problems and foot problems are often prescribed these specialty insoles by their doctors.

Tonsor (31 W. Adams St., 619-7608) opened up last June. It's a true, old-fashioned men's barber shop. Owner and barber Joseph Berardino says that they aim to "bring back what service used to be...and make people feel comfortable." Lots of folks who come in get nostalgic, remembering when their fathers used to bring them to the barber shop.

Shop owners like Joseph Berardino and Ron Chamblin and businesses such as Ortho and Perdue are the backbone of Downtown. Their restaurants, services and small business that are a vital part of Downtown's improvement.

FASTER FOOD

Downtown's New Lunch Delivery Option **BY JACK DIABLO**

Joe Gaskin and Matt Bort were riding their bikes downtown to get a bite to eat one sunny afternoon when an idea occurred to them. As they flew past business people hustling to and from Downtown eateries on their lunch breaks, they realized there was a way to combine their two favorite things in the world (bikes and food) and maybe make some money in the process. In that moment Velo Foods was born.

Starting in May, Velo Foods will take to the streets providing lunchtime delivery to Downtown and Five Points. No longer will hungry workers have to battle the hassle of Downtown parking to enjoy a burrito or sandwich. Velo Foods will bring your favorite meal right to your office for a nominal fee. As of now, two restaurants have signed on to offer their

services. The boys hooked up with Chew's Richard Reichstadter and Burrito Gallery's Marco Monroi to negotiate the terms of the new service. Both restaurants were more than eager to get on board and Velo Foods hopes that other eateries will follow suit.

Matt and Joe are no strangers to the local bike scene. Matt worked in various bike shops and couriered downtown before making and designing messenger bags at Burro. Joe also worked in bike shops and is one of the founding members of Zombie Bikes. They're also incredibly fond of food. Gaskin once ate 101 chicken nuggets at the Roosevelt Chik-Fil-A and Bort has been known to put away half of a Mojo's "whole hawg" in under fifteen minutes. The two seem destined for this line of work.

It's no secret that Jacksonville is rated pretty low on just about every list of bike-friendly cities. In fact, Bicycling Magazine rated it as one of the top three worst cities in a recent issue. But that doesn't stop its advocates from the making the best of a bad situation. From the community-minded volunteers at Zombie Bikes to the BikeJax bike valet at RAM, the locals are making up for our city leadership's failure to make the appropriate accommodations for cyclists. "Velo Foods is as much a business venture as it is a way to prove to the people of Jacksonville and our local government that biking in the urban core is an essential and viable form of transportation," says Joe.

Bicycle delivery solves many problems at once. For one, it's green, creating no carbon footprint making it an ecologically-conscious alternative to car delivery. In most cases, it's also faster. "We can go places cars can't go and we don't have to deal with parking," says Matt. "We've been riding these streets for years and know the quickest routes. Let us worry about one-way streets and traffic."

It's that easy. All you'll have to do is call Burrito Gallery or Chew to place your order and in 30 to 45 minutes, one of Velo Foods' riders will show up, food in hand.

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



NEW NIGHTLIFE AND OLD FAVES

The Downtown Bar Scene **BY JACK DIABLO**

This time last year, the buzz on the Downtown nightlife seemed to focus on the opening of the Sinclair. The year before that it was the Ivy Ultra Bar. Well, to borrow a line from a friend, the "good depression" has been incredibly kind to the Downtown bar scene. Downtown Jacksonville's recent cultural renaissance (can we go ahead and call it that?) has witnessed the opening of two new establishments over the past year and the expansion of a third. Dos Gatos and Lit have joined the ranks of the existing, established nightlife community. Poppy Love Smoke, which has been part of the scene for a few years, has recently seen major expansion.

Dos Gatos may be new to Jacksonville, but its owners, Jason and Joy Albertelli, share a wealth of experience in the service industry. Before returning to his hometown, Jason oversaw the operation of multiple bars in Los Angeles and San Francisco. Albertelli saw a need for something new and different in the bar scene of his hometown so he and his wife decided to do something about it. As Jason puts it, "There's a ton of cool kids in Jax, but the bar owners feed them the same old mediocrity: bad music, bartenders who don't know anything about what they're doing or selling, and zero atmosphere or style." The Albertelli's responded by opening Dos Gatos at 123 East Forsyth.

Style is something the Albertelli's believe their customers will find in spades at their "sexy rock 'n roll cocktail lounge." Dos Gatos isn't much to look at from the outside. If it weren't for the crowd of smokers gathered out front you would probably miss the place completely, if you didn't know where to look. But what the bar lacks in exterior panache, it makes up in interior ambiance. Once inside Dos Gatos you may find yourself asking, "Am I still in Jacksonville?"

While the bar may have a "bigger" city vibe, the inspiration for the decor actually came from the building's existing architecture with a few of the Albertelli's own personal touches. "I have my own philosophy on design," Jason explains. "I hate unfinished ceilings, so the barrel vault in the lounge and the pressed-tin ceiling in the bar area were details I felt necessary." Jay feels these unique touches make his bar special.

But the Dos Gatos vibe is only partly due to its look. One thing that sets this particular establishment apart from the competition is the entertainment they provide. DG caters more to the rock 'n roll crowd and doesn't play any hip hop or dance music. It's not that they don't appreciate those styles of music, it's just not what their bar is about.

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
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Poppy Love Smoke

Possibly the most appealing draw of Dos Gatos is its cocktails. Jay feels that his liquor selection and cocktail menu are “unmatched” and is confident in his staff’s ability to provide unparalleled service. “People know that if they come to DG and order a cocktail, whether it be one of our signatures, a standard, or a pre-prohibition classic, my team will execute it perfectly,” Jay boasts. If the happy hour crowd that seems to grow larger every day is any indication, the Albertelli’s may very well be on to something here.

Another addition to Downtown is the equally discreet new bar Lit. Located just around the corner from Dos Gatos on Ocean Street between Bay and Forsyth, Lit has no exterior signage either. To find this almost secret new spot, you need only look for the bizarre but tasteful facade of angled wooden blocks and the single velvet rope that is only put out during business hours. Don’t judge the book by its cover. Although the entrance seems to suggest a small but cozy speak-easy, Lit’s high ceilings and interior arrangement create an atmosphere that feels open and spacious while maintaining an intimate charm. The bar can equally accommodate a handful of folks or a shoulder-to-shoulder crowd without feeling too crowded or too empty. The designers seem to have taken tips from the native architecture as well by preserving the brick walls and restoring a hundred year-old hand-painted advertisement mural that covers the wall behind the bar.

Whereas Dos Gatos took its cues from the LA bar scene, Lit has a more New York vibe to it with its subdued lighting (hence the name) and sleek design elements. There is a lounge feel to it at first but the open dance floor area has the potential to accommodate a full-blown dance party as Nick Puzo, aka DJ NickFRESH, is keenly aware. He hosts Act Like You Know, the bar’s new service industry night on Mondays. Although ALYK is only a few weeks old, Nick watches the crowd grow each time as he whips up what he calls a “terrific hybrid of soul, funk, italo and other groove-driven sounds” to dance away that case of the Mondaze. With no cover and cheap drink specials, it is the place to cut loose on what is otherwise a pretty dull night. Nick has DJed successful nights at bars all over town but believes that Downtown’s inherent walkability and the diversity of its options are what make it the best nightlife destination in Jacksonville.

“A lot of new happenings are going on, offering a wide variety of things to do,” he says. “Entertainment is available here.”

The cigar and wine bar, Poppy Love Smoke at 112 East Adams Street, offers a different take on the nightlife experience. Poppy Love Smoke is a place to chill out and relax. To help you unwind, the bar boasts a full walk-in humidor filled with hundreds of premium cigars as well as a 2,500 bottle wine rack. If a quiet evening with a few friends is what you’re looking for, PLS may very well be worth checking out on your next Downtown excursion.

All three of these new bars are located in close proximity to what is shaping up to be a hot new section of Downtown, particularly during Art Walk. With all of these bars within one block of the unofficial nucleus of activity that is the old library, combined with the opening of The Lettershop (see article on page 12) just another block east on Forsyth, there’s a lot of potential to attract thirsty Art-Walkers during the widely-attended event.

Of course, there are many old Downtown favorites still doing their thing and bringing people out to party as they see fit. No look at Downtown nightlife would be complete without mentioning what has come to be known as the entertainment district on East Bay Street. Mark’s, Dive Bar and Club TSI can all be found on the same block allowing choosy club-goers several options right in a row. The Ivy Ultra Bar is just a short walk west and from there it’s only a couple of blocks to Lit, Dos Gatos, London Bridge and Poppy Love Smoke. Slightly off the beaten path on Downtown’s west end one can still find something to do at Cafe 331 or the Sinclair. And of course, the Jacksonville Landing is always an option with live entertainment in the courtyard and a variety of bars and restaurants to satisfy just about any taste.

With the new nightlife destinations and the continued success of the trusty old standbys, Downtown Jacksonville is shaping up to become *the* destination for those seeking the ultimate nightlife experience in Northeast Florida. So make it a point to check out what all the fuss is about and head Downtown to try something new. You’ll like what you find, I promise.

WHERE THERE IS A WILL, THERE IS A SPACE.

A Downtown gallery update BY SHEA SLEMMER

You don't have to be keen on anything "art" to know about Art Walk. The fifteen block self-guided tour of Downtown Jacksonville held on the first Wednesday of every month has grown to include much more than a few galleries. In fact, at the end of 2009, there were not a large number of galleries in the Urban Core, but because of the tenacious attitude of Downtown Vision, Inc., there were still over forty venues that participated every month. I'd say this is primarily due to businesses seeing the benefit of displaying local art on the walls, even if it is between racks of dry cleaning and jewelry cases.

Today there are more gallery spaces, due to property owners recognizing that an un-leased retail space gets a lot more attention when hundreds of people file through because someone finally gave them an excuse to. Landlords who've had their space lay vacant for years have little to lose when artists use the space. That's the idea behind Downtown Vision, Inc.'s Off the Grid program.

It's hard for anyone to ignore the role the arts play in urban revitalization. On January 26th, 2010, Mayor Peyton held a meeting with the Northeast Florida Builders Association with the mindset that spaces for artists to work and exhibit downtown equals artists wanting to live near their respective work spaces, which equals more Downtown retail which, to me, seems like a reasonable formula for my Saturday evening bike ride involving more than the sound of crickets.

Just before that, almost in conjunction with Peyton's thought, Downtown Vision, Inc. and the Cultural Council of Greater Jacksonville combined forces to kick start Off the Grid, inspired by local artist, Jim Draper, pairing artists in need of a space with landlords in need of a tenant. On March 18th a launch party was held to point the last piece of the puzzle, the collector, in the right direction. Within one month of opening night, there are already seven studios participating in this Off the Grid partnership.

In addition to the studio spaces that are part of the Off the Grid program, privately funded galleries are popping up in unlikely spaces. Over on Union Street across from Winn-Dixie there is an un-assuming two-story beige brick building that is home to 323 Modernism. The Modern Art Gallery is owned and operated by local artist JD Lambert, who seems to have a knack for finding interesting work whether it is painting, sculpture or furniture. After a tour of the 5,500 sq ft. space equipped with all the amenities including a full-sized air hockey table, I am convinced that where there is a will, there is a space and, whether you are an artist looking for a place to show your work or a collector of local art, I urge you to do a little research of your own about what is brewing with our Downtown art scene. 

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THE LETTERSHOP GRAND OPENING

The young entrepreneurs of Jacksonville's very own Burro Bags are making news once again. Coinciding with the May Art Walk, the messenger bag makers will celebrate the grand opening of their new location and retail store.

Burro Bags began when Matt Bort and Chris Williams teamed up to create a durable but affordable solution to their daily bicycle commute from Springfield to UNF. In the early days they made messenger bags for friends out of their house but soon needed more space.

After hooking up with a benevolent landlord, they found a new home on Main Street, at what came to be known as the BBB Complex. The converted auto lot became a collective of sorts, a cultural oasis shared by Royal Treatment, a consignment record shop and Zombie Bikes. Over the the next two years Burro Bags grew in popularity not only locally but internationally. Somewhere along the way John O'Brian, Josh Dunn and Jack Twachtman joined the team with the hopes that one day they might actually get paid for helping out their friends.

Sales were rising and things were looking up until February, when they learned they would have to vacate the BBB by the end of the month. Time being of the essence, they quickly set out to secure a new location for their business.

Enter Downtown Vision, Inc. and their Off the Grid program. Under the suggestion of local artist Jim Draper, DVI has been instrumental in pairing artists with Downtown property owners to fill vacant spaces by untraditional means. Although not artists in the traditional sense, the organization felt Burro Bags fit the bill and put them in contact with Rich Trendel of

Petra Management, Inc. who helped them find their new digs.

Burro Bags now occupies the Lettershop building at 228 E. Forsyth. The new location provides the company with enough room to house their operation as well as a street-level retail space to showcase their wares as well as those of other local independent designers. In addition to the boutique, the building will also house a record shop co-run by Ian Ranne of Royal Treatment Records and Cash Carter of Moon Colony Razorblade. With Shaun Thurston as the resident artist, the new location is set to be an exciting addition to the renaissance of activity Downtown has seen of late.

For their grand opening party, the Lettershop team is pulling no punches. New murals painted by Thurston will be on display set to the tunes of DJ Triclopsl. Free beer will flow and good times will be had by all.

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A BETTER JACKSONVILLE BY DESIGN

A Four Part Series on AIGA Jacksonville

you'll see while driving along I-95. If they looked terrible, people might form a negative perception of the city zoo and decide not to visit it. Anyone who's been to the Jacksonville Zoo will tell you it's a crowning jewel on Jacksonville's Northside. Like most things in life, you only have one chance to make a first impression. Putting our best (designed) foot forward increases the likelihood of making a connection with people and encouraging them to invest in our city's businesses and residents.

Let's take that example one step further. When you walk into a retail store or restaurant in Jacksonville that's been merchandised and designed well, you're transported to another place. Nestliving (www.nest-living.com) in 5 Points gives you a sense of place, like arriving at a destination of note. Ditto for Chew, a restaurant in downtown Jacksonville. The same cannot be said when you walk into a fast food restaurant or a knick-knack gift shop.

Design is important and plays a role in how things are perceived both by the residents of the city and by visitors. Good design instills a sense of pride and respect for one's city. Good design increases our city's reputation. Design magazines like Communication Arts highlight talented designers from around the country. Increasingly you will see Jacksonville designers appear in these annuals, reinforcing the case that our city embraces good design. If we can only continue to build the graphic design community in Jacksonville we will continue to attract and retain talented young designers who bring with them the enthusiasm, creativity and energy needed to improve our city.

Part 3: Enhancing and Contributing to the Community Fabric

Everyone is talking about community. Online communities like Facebook and Twitter have given birth to micro-communities that revolve around fan pages and hash tags. Tough economic times have forced people to look seriously at themselves and make value judgements on what's important. Many are finding things like garage sales, knitting and bingo to have more value than Target, the Gap and video games.

Jacksonville residents are beginning to realize that a great city begins with a strong community and I agree with this wholeheartedly. As a connector in the community, I see an increase in people engaging with others to build and grow our local community. Jacksonville is beginning to realize a vibrant community does not create itself; it takes hard work and initiative. Building a stronger community is not something one person can do. It takes hundreds of committed individuals and organizations doing small things.

As Northeast Florida's local chapter of AIGA, the professional association for design, AIGA Jacksonville is actively contributing to the local community. AIGA Jacksonville understands the value of design as not only a professional craft, but also a strategic tool and vital cultural force.

Design, when woven into the fabric of a city, elevates the entire community. Design can uplift the spirit and build respect for one's community and city. In a January Urban Jacksonville post entitled "20 Urban Jacksonville Predictions for 2010" I commented on the parallel between design and community, saying "Graphic design in the city will continue marching forward, elevate the city visually in ways we haven't experienced."

I was called out by a reader who asked to explain this prediction: "What does this even mean? 'Elevate the city visually in ways we haven't experienced?' What, nicer ads being put up?" This comment hinted at a limited public understanding of the design community and its far-reaching impact. So let me explain my theory on how graphic design can elevate a community.

By having a strong design community, we present a visually unified face to people who may only experience Jacksonville through the media, billboards or logos we create. Each well-designed component of Jacksonville, be it a bus stop ad or a public city space, reflects positively on the city.

Let's take outdoor advertising, a straightforward example of design, as an example. The Jacksonville Zoo and Gardens billboards are interesting and visually striking examples of design



When people think about AIGA in the community most think of design-specific events like Art Walk or other popular art shows. There is another side to AIGA in the community and it's about giving back. The AIGA Jacksonville Gives Back program has actively supported community staples such as the City Rescue Mission, the Salvation Army and the Jacksonville Arboretum & Gardens. This illustrates dedication to varied aspects of the local community, not just art and design. Next month, AIGA Jacksonville will participate in St. Baldrick's Foundation's Shave It For Kids' Cancer 2010, raising funds and awareness for childhood cancer research.

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
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downtown jacksonville is where it's at

an interview with Matthew Bennett by shea slemmer



Matthew Bennett was born in Baltimore, MD where he attended the Maryland Institute College of Art. He is currently working from his Downtown studio on Bay Street, but this isn't the first time he has found himself living in Jacksonville due to the fact that his wife is a nurse-midwife in the Navy and they move quite frequently. "My family and I live a sort of nomadic life," says Bennett. "This is our third time living here and it has really come to feel like home. Jacksonville has been very good to me."

Bennett has shown and sold his work in the United States and Japan, which is where he is headed once again in July of this year. His worldly nature may explain the "blend of traditional techniques with modern

sensibility" his artist statement touts him for.

From what I've seen, Bennett uses the pencil and the brush. The series he is currently working on, titled A New Romanticism, combines large scale oil paintings with equally grand pencil renderings of classical motifs which are very much like narratives that echo the natural world. His muted color palette captures a mood and light that highlights the physical presence of his subjects, which are often static and isolated. Even when I see movement in his brush strokes, Bennett's work still seems to have a meditative quality and touch on the silence of life. I am not speaking in a mystical sense, but rather from a grounded perspective; it's just that to me, Bennett's paintings remind us of what we are apt to forget. Maybe that there is a dolphin in the cloud overhead or that your wife looks very pretty tonight. It is those details that have the power to make machines seem worthless and suddenly, learning from our fellow man becomes a gateway to what we may have lost.

EU caught up with Bennett for an interview between his regular monthly exhibitions at various Downtown Art Walk locations and preparing for an upcoming show at R. Roberts Gallery in Avondale, of which the opening reception will be held on May 7th from 6- 9 pm.

EU Jacksonville: How do you like having a studio Downtown above the Arts Center Cooperative on Bay Street? Have you had any experience with other parts of the city?

Matthew Bennett: Downtown Jacksonville is where it's at. I love Riverside and San Marco and the Beaches, but if you're producing or interested in cutting edge art in Jacksonville, Downtown is really the only place to be. The Cultural Council and Downtown Vision Inc. have done an incredible job of finding space for artists to work and show their work. I have an amazing studio space that I share with other artist's and dancers. It's a great time to be a working artist in Jacksonville.

EU: Do you discuss your work with other artists? Do you feel that you benefit from working next to other artists Downtown?

MB: Having the space on Bay Street allows me to connect with some of the best artists working in Florida on almost a daily basis. I've never seen anything like the quality of work being produced here right now. Joey Thate, Dat Nguyen, Kim Barry, Megan Cosby, Ed Hall and Matt Abercrombie are some of the great artists that I get to interact with regularly. Their art is inspiring. If you aren't familiar with these guys and their work you should get down to the next First Wednesday Art Walk and get to know them.

EU: Tell me about the series you are working on right now. How would you describe it?

MB: I consider myself a traditional artist. My painting techniques are varied but firmly rooted in a classical style. The series that I'm working on right now is called A New Romanticism. It's about finding a modern approach to classicism, while rejecting disposable fads and pure academism. It's definitely a transitional



series. Each piece has its own meaning to me, but collectively it's an effort to break free from the trap of technique for its own sake and to create something that has a presence greater than the subject matter would suggest.

EU: From what I have seen of your new work, I assume you notice details about women, like how they dress. Would you say that is accurate? What is it about a woman that inspires you?

MB: It's true. I love women. What can I say? I joke sometimes that my paintings take a long time and if I have to look at something for four weeks straight it might as well be something I enjoy. There's some truth there, but it's more than that. The paintings I've done of dresses on the antique dress form are really about a sense of absence and longing. What's not there is more important than what is, but that's all you've got. Beyond that, I find women interesting and inspiring... and I get bored easily so I paint and draw what I like.

EU: Do you have any exhibitions coming up? Where can we see your work?

MB: You can always catch me during the First Wednesday Art Walk Downtown at either the old Hayden-Burns library or Suite 106 at the Landing. But if you'd like to see my entire new body of work I'll be featured during the first weeks of May at R. Roberts Gallery in Avondale. The opening is Friday, May 7th.

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SHIP SHAPE IN JAX

Naval Ship Museum Store BY ERIN THURSBY

Jacksonville is a military town. Our Naval bases are a source of pride as well as something that keeps our city economy fairly steady. Regular military checks mean that those consumers keep spending, keeping our local retail market from crashing as hard as it could.

Our ties with the military is one of the reasons why you'll find the ADAMS Class Museum Visitor Center at the Jacksonville Landing a must-stop Downtown. But the main reason is their dedicated effort to acquire a decommissioned Navy Guided Missile Destroyer, the USS Charles F. Adams (DDG-2), as a floating attraction in the St. Johns River.

This vessel was the first of its kind, and as such, an entire class of 23 vessels, the Adams class, was named after it. The Adams was the first guided missile ship built from the keel up rather than retro-fitted. During the Cold War, Adams Class vessels were a big part of the US sea borne defense.

John E. O'Neil, Jr., Captain, USN (Ret) served on the USS Lynde McCormick (DDG-8) out of San Diego and he's also a board member of the Jacksonville Historic Naval Ship Association. According to O'Neil, the Adams in "mothballs" in Philadelphia is the only Adams class vessel left in the US not yet scrapped or sunk. "As the first of its kind, it's historically valuable." He also notes that those who served on Adams class vessels have "a deep love" for the ships. The US built three Adams class vessels for Australia and then three for West Germany. Later as the US versions were retired, four were sold to Greece. Australia named their three DDG's the Perth class. One Aussie, Richard Merek, came all the way from western Australia to Jacksonville see how the effort to "bring the USS Adams home to Jacksonville" was going.

While some might worry that this floating museum would take away from our already established museums and galleries, it's clear that a Naval ship museum would be reaching out and attracting a different audience than those who would go out of their way to travel to an art museum. It would be a destination for schools and ROTC groups, Naval reunion groups, military buffs and more. And, if some of these groups come for several days, they might just visit our other Downtown amenities as well as the art museums that didn't initially attract them.

If you're curious about the drive to put the USS Adams in the St. Johns, visit their website at www.adamsclassmuseum.org or go to the ADAMS Class Museum Visitor Center in the Landing. There are some interactive displays of a navy ship's inner workings, ship models and merchandise for every branch of the military.

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WAY MORE THAN BOOKS

Why I take my date to the library

I have a crush. It's not an ordinary crush, like on a boy or a movie star. No, this crush is on a building, made of brick and steel and glass. Turns out I'm completely smitten with the downtown Main Street Library. Every Wednesday, rain or shine, my two year old daughter and I load up in my little car and venture to the headquarters of the Duval County Library System.

I have to admit that I wouldn't normally consider myself a lover of libraries. Sure, I read and generally like learning. But to be honest, most of my previous experiences with libraries have been of the school research project, book searching and little-old-librarian-hushing variety. They were "serious" buildings, usually entered because of the force of something else propelling me through the front doors, like a high school assignment or college paper. So my crush admission comes as much of a surprise to me as it does to you.

I remember my first encounter with the library a few years ago. Armed with a bag of goldfish crackers, extra diapers and all the typical mom artillery, I navigated through the tricky one way streets until I finally landed myself in a metered parking spot along Duval Street. I entered through conference level off Main Street and was immediately struck by the spacious size of the hallway. It turns out that much of what I would fall in love with that day and on the many visits to come would be the grand scale of many features in this building. I love, for instance, the large, open staircases on every floor, the spacious outdoor courtyard featuring a breathtaking water fountain and the tomato red colored Grand Reading Room, covered in maps and by far my favorite room in the 300,000 sq. ft. five-story building.

While the libraries of my childhood were seats of literary creativity, the main street library is brimming with visual and musical art. Resting on the ground level is a small auditorium which regularly hosts musical performances. Throughout the entire building, photography and art grace many square feet of wall space. My favorite work of art is the large, three-story murals in the Grand Staircase, commissioned by an artist who painstakingly drew scenes depicting the history of Jacksonville. Every time we go, my daughter and I stop and stare, taking in the scenes, and always walk away having found something we'd never noticed before.

I also love the benefits of bringing my daughter to the library. Like most parents I know, I want to cultivate in her a love for learning and reading. The Children's Department at the Main Street Library does an amazing job of inviting in young readers. The activity calendar is chock full of activities for kids ranging in age from baby to 14 years-old. My daughter and I personally love Preschool Project on Wednesday mornings with Jamie Sanborn. In that hour, she gets a dose of story time, art time, free play, singing and socializing, which are all great things for her stage of development. The staff is helpful, cheerful and personable.

But aside from these good, kid-gear things, I'm just as smitten with the less obvious perks of taking my daughter to the library. A trip to downtown inevitably means exposing her to things we don't see everyday in our suburban neighborhood. We get to see the hustle and bustle of the city streets, pedestrians moving about their business, people of different socio-economic classes and racial diversity, historic buildings and beautiful architecture. This isn't the suburbs in all of its 21st century city planning, new construction and car-dependent predictability. This is the city, a place where people walk to their destination. A place that, like many cities around the world, smells of hot concrete and rubber tires and today's special being cooked up at the nearby café.

I can't help but view the library as a mini version of downtown Jacksonville. Much like the city it sits in, the library offers educational opportunities, art, cultural diversity, history lessons and architectural beauty. And while I have heard people argue the irrelevance of Downtown in today's society, resources like the Main Street Library (the largest library in the state, by the way) have me coming back for more, week after week.

From an architectural perspective, the Jacksonville skyline is the perfect backdrop for the 2010 Jacksonville Jazz Festival with its eclectic mix of contemporary angles and neoclassical designs.

Musically, the lineup is equally unique, with artists known for their smooth jazz standards and Latin-infused styles to pop flavors and the big brass sounds of New Orleans.

Multiple stages with such names as the Groovin' Stage, Breezin' Stage, Swingin' Stage and the River Stage will be positioned at various locations throughout the heart of downtown Jacksonville. Participants can enjoy live music while strolling past some of the city's most revered landmarks.

Performers include nationally recognized artists Chris Botti, Tito Puente Jr., Spyro Gyro and Patti LaBelle. Irvin Mayfield & the New Orleans Jazz Orchestra, Preservation Hall Jazz Band, the Joe Balone Trio, Isaac Byrd & Tribe Judah, Buckwheat Zydeco, the Superstars of Jazz and local chanteuse Jordyn Jackson also perform. See schedule for the full performance line up at each venue.

Jackson, 26, of Jacksonville Beach is embarking on a solo career after recently parting ways with the alt-rock outfit Veronica's Veil. She recorded her solo album, *Last September in the Garden*, in 2009 at the Fudge Recording Studio in New Orleans. This is Jackson's first appearance at the Jacksonville Jazz Festival where she will be joined by musicians Jake Smith on acoustic guitar, Joseph Walker on electric guitar, Darren Phipps on bass and drummer Chris Arceneaux, all of whom hail from the Big Easy and contributed on her solo release.

Local musicians Johnny Flood on saxophone and Ray Callender on trumpet with violinist Pasha Sabouri of Texas will also perform with Jackson.

"This is the first time I have played a festival of this size so I'm so excited," Jackson said in a recent interview. "It's the first time for me to have a band of this magnitude behind me. I hope it will open doors to perform at other festivals and introduce new fans to my music."

As an aspiring artist, Jackson said she welcomes any opportunity offering a creative release. Fronting Veronica's Veil allowed her to break free from her comfort zone of pop and jazz but, ultimately, she said she needed to pursue her own artistic vision.

"It was a struggle because my voice was always drowned out by the guitars. It was really a fun experience but it never really suited my goal as a singer," Jackson said. "I wanted to record an album that really featured my vocals. Ballads are my favorite to

sing. I enjoy the challenge and I want to challenge myself."

Growing up, Jackson said she taught herself to sing by emulating Whitney Houston and counts Christina Aguilera, Freddie Mercury, Eva Cassidy and Robert Plant among her influences.

Professionally, she hopes to take the same path as contemporary crooner Michael Buble' whom she admires for his ability to strike the perfect balance between the jazz standards and mainstream pop music.

"My dad always said my voice sounded best doing jazz and pop songs. Of course, I didn't listen to him," laughed Jackson. "But now I feel that's the direction I'm meant for."

The Jacksonville Jazz Festival will also offer art exhibits, wine tasting, performance competitions, free jazz talks at the MOCA Jacksonville Theater and a Jacksonville Jazz Hall of Fame display.

Two Jacksonville jazz greats will also be honored for their contributions to the city. Bob Bednar and Na'im Rashid are recognized among the 2010 Hall of Fame inductees.

As host of the radio program "This is Jazz" for 20 years, Bednar works to promote and support local jazz efforts. He is also a well-respected player in the local music community where he is known for his skills as a jazz drummer.

Rashid served as host of the Jazz Jam at the historic Ritz Theatre where he is active in the newly established Ritz Jazz Society of Jacksonville. He is also a noted emcee at past jazz festivals and past member of the judging panel for the Jacksonville Jazz Piano Competition.

On Thursday May 27, the Jacksonville Jazz Piano Competition kicks off at 7 pm at the Florida Theatre, located at 128 E. Forsyth Street. Participants will compete for a \$3,500 prize and the opportunity to perform Saturday on the Swingin' Stage on Monroe Street. Local musician Noel Freidline will emcee the event. General admission tickets are \$10.

The Wine Down Tasting Experience is held three different days: Friday, May 28 from 5 to 10 pm; Saturday, May 29 from noon to 10 pm and Sunday, May 30 from noon to 6 pm at Laura Street between Monroe and Duval. Tickets are \$20 and include six samples of featured wines and a limited edition wine glass.

The 'Round Midnight Jam is held from 10 pm to 2 am Saturday, May 29 at the Omni Jacksonville Hotel, the official host hotel of the festival, at 245 Water Street. The Kelly/Scott Quintet host the event. Admission is free.

Art in the Heart of Jacksonville Show & Sale will showcase the work of artists and craftsman in a variety of mediums along Adams Street from Laura to Main streets. Admission is free. Judging will be held from 5 to 8 pm Friday, May 28.

Festival parking will be available along Laura Street at the MOCA Jacksonville, Main Library and Snyder Memorial Church; Hemming Plaza, Main Street and the Cummer Museum of Art and Gardens. Parking will be available on Saturday at the Riverside Arts Market. A map of the parking sites and fees is available at www.jaxjazzfest.com. A Jazz Trolley will shuttle festival goers to their destination from 11 am to 8 pm May 29 and 30. Cost is \$1 per one-way ride ticket and \$5 wristbands are available for a weekend pass and can be purchased at all trolley stops.







Live music and DJs can be seen on the stage in the back seven nights a week. GATES OPEN AT NOON

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Artist: Telepathik Friend
Album: Turn On the Resonator (CD-R)
Label: Self-Released

Former Jacksonvillian and champion of the local experimental music scene, Logan Owlbeemoth, recently self-released a new Telepathik Friend CD-R that not-so-mysteriously ended up in my mailbox after a late-night Facebook exchange. The last time we saw Logan he was dressed in neon with a mask made of pipe cleaners and a stuffed monkey hanging from his pants, rapping over noisy deconstructed beats. Nowadays he calls Austin, TX home, but continues to make music as Telepathik Friend and still finds the time to book and host shows out of his garage, aka Discovery Village.

Telepathik Friend has always been an amorphous collective of noisemakers whose past affiliates include other Jacksonville locals such as Matrix Infinity and Chris Spohn. The current incarnation features familiar faces such as founding members Owlbeemoth himself and Omebi, as well as new friends How I Quit Crack, Skullcaster and Joe Legzz. *Turn On the Resonator* features two live group tracks with additional tracks from each solo member. What results is a compilation of strange and spacey tracks sure to transport your consciousness into previously unexplored realms. From the slowcore droning of TP proper to Skullcaster's wet lasers, one thing is clear: Telepathik Friend has risen above the confines of free-form noise to something altogether unique while retaining that avant-garde sensibility we've come to expect.

If your only experience of this kind of experimental music is limited to 3rd-hand jokes about "noise" shows in the Riverside Publix frozen food aisle, you owe it to yourself to at least experience it. This album is most certainly not noise and manages to keep things listenable despite being pretty far out there. It's a shame that Logan had to get out of Jacksonville to create what is quite possibly his best work to date; at the very least, it's good to know that Duval is being well-represented.

Jacksonville troubadour Kevin Lee Newberry has just released his new album *The Dark Presser*. Self-produced with the help of Infintesimal Records, the record is his second within a single year. The prolific songwriter seems to have expanded his musical scope with this release, casually wandering away from (escaping?) the confines of our expectations.

A while ago I described a live show review of Kevin as more Townes Van Zandt than Elliot Smith in terms of the brutally honest, at times depressing music that he writes. If he hadn't added my name to the Thank You's on *The Dark Presser*, I might have thought he wrote this album simply to spite me as my first thought was exactly the opposite of that sentiment. This record is far more Elliot Smith than TVZ as we find Kevin flirting with poppier melodies, expanded instrumentation, and what at times could loosely be described as indie rock. Whereas before I would have described KLN as "boozey singer/songwriter," I find I must create a new sub-sub-genre to classify this material. The best I could come up with is "shoe-gaze country."

There's something just a tad bit brighter about this record. Maybe I'm just that more optimistic these days, or perhaps Mr. Newberry is as well. Don't get me wrong, there's nothing particularly happy about a single song on this record, but something about it just seems, well, less dark. Or at least it has just a hint more of the tragicomic as opposed to being blatantly depressing.

What really stands out on this record is the production. The layered vocals reminded me of something the late Mark Linkous would have done on a Sparklehorse album, and the subtle background noises picked up in the recording make it seem more intimate, like you're right there with him in his garage studio.

All I can say at this point is that I've listened to the first track only twice and it's been stuck in my head for days. Be sure to check out Kevin Lee Newberry at his CD release party at Lomax Lodge on May 8th where he'll share the stage with fellow Infintesimal bands Tuffy, Honey Chamber, The 2416 and Memphibians. - JACK DIABLO



EU Talks to Florida Folk Festival Headliner Billy Dean

Over 150 years ago, Stephen Collins Foster penned a song from his Pennsylvania home about a stretch of river hundreds of miles away in sunny Florida. Foster wrote of being far, far away "way down upon the Suwannee River," randomly selecting the waterway because the name fit the poetic meter of the song.

Foster never visited the Suwannee River, nor did he ever set foot on Florida soil. But his story of the place the old folks called home forever captured the idyllic spirit of the land as he imagined it and sparked the beginning of the American folk movement.

Today, some 159 years later, the annual Florida Folk Festival is held at the scenic Stephen Foster Folk Culture Center State Park in White Springs, nestled along the mossy banks of the legendary river immortalized in Foster's ode "Old Folks at Home."

The 58th annual festival is held over Memorial Day weekend and features performances from country music stars Mel Tillis and headliner Billy Dean.

Dean, a native of Quincy, Florida, fondly recalls the first time he visited the grounds of the Stephen Foster Folk Culture Center. He said he performed "at that very place" with his 7th grade music teacher, not knowing that one day he would be returning to the stage as a featured artist.

"When I found out about the folk festival, as a Floridian myself, I hoped the folk community would embrace me if I came out with just my guitar and not try to put on some big slick country music show," he said in a phone interview from Salt Lake City, Utah.

Having nearly reaching the summit in his bid for country music stardom, Dean said he missed the quiet strength of simple storytelling. The industry, he said, stripped the stories down to bare-bones with just enough meat left to get by.

"I've always been torn between country music and folk music," he said. "I was right on the cusp of a big country music career in Nashville. But in country music, the songs don't unfold. They don't take the time to really tell a story."

Dean said his fans have responded warmly to his less glittery image. They identify with the man on the stage instead of the persona. They aren't looking for a big city arena show and neither is Dean. It's all about connecting with people through the stories.

"They can get up close and personal. It's tangible. They can feel it," Dean said. "As long as I can do what I love, I have the best of both worlds."

The Florida Folk Festival is Friday thru Sunday, May 28-30, 2010. Advance tickets are \$20 for a single day, \$40 for the weekend and \$25 per day or \$50 for the weekend at the gate. Children under six years old are admitted free. Gates open daily at 8 pm. The park also offers demonstrations on quilting, blacksmithing and stained glass making.



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I HOPE YOU DANCE... FOREVER

Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater at the Times-Union Center's Moran Theater, May 18

When it comes to dancing, technique is key and passion is essential. The Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater provides customary strategies for dancers striving to create moments to be remembered for a lifetime. EU recently had the opportunity to speak with Renee Robinson, the last dancer to be chosen by Alvin Ailey before his untimely death. Robinson is a 28-year company member who fell in love with dancing at the age of 10. She began training in classical ballet at the Jones-Haywood School of Ballet and received two Ford Foundation scholarships to the School of American Ballet. She was also awarded full scholarships to the Dance Theater of Harlem School and the Ailey School.

Her current roles, along with dancing, include teaching company classes, speaking for children's performances and giving background and technical information to prospective dancers in order to ensure a special dance experience.

In 1958, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater was founded in New York, with the mission of making dance accessible through dance training and innovative community outreach. With an initial enrollment of 125 students, it didn't receive its accreditation until 1982 from the National Association of Schools of Dance. A remarkable faculty of dance professionals trains more than 5000 students annually in full-time programs for aspiring dance students, the Professional Division and Ailey II (Junior Division headed by Sylvia Waters, designed to aid 12 dancers in their personal and professional transition). The company also offers Ailey Extension classes for members of the general public not associated with the school. The AAADT is the largest facility dedicated to dance with performances seen in over 70 countries on six continents. The company continues to maintain a focus on the idea that dance comes from the people and should be delivered back to the people.

Renee Robinson is currently one of 30 beautiful dancers embarking on a 20-city tour celebration, highlighting the achievements of Artistic Director Judith Jamison as she continues to keep the organization successful while striving to remain true to the principle of Alvin Ailey's original vision. A recipient of the Kennedy Center Honors, Ms. Jamison is a well-known, accomplished figure in modern dance and has greatly influenced those around her, including Robinson. She recently led a 50-city tour celebrating the company's 50th Anniversary, vowing to keep Ailey's memory alive while continuing to preserve his legacy. The AAADT continues to provide an outlet for dancers who hope to uplift their communities through a cultural art form that inspires, promotes and supports the goal of unity.

Robinson enthusiastically describes dancing as "something I absolutely enjoy" and claims that each performer is "not only great in technical styles, but committed to the passion, energy, joy and celebration of dancing." Audience members can expect a physical and emotional rendition of one classic ballet, featuring a broad range of styles with jazz and classy overtones. Robinson believes in the motto, "There is no such thing as a dumb dancer" and speaks openly and strongly about what it takes to become successful as a professional. She truthfully informs aspiring young dancers about the business, reminding them that no matter what level they reach, taking dance classes will always be a way of life. She is also an adamant believer in eating well and tries to stay extremely disciplined by firmly sticking to her "leafy, green vegetable" diet.

Ms. Robinson has potent words of advice for any dancer with the desire to achieve ultimate success. "You take care of your instrument by taking care of yourself... get your rest, get out and learn about life, continue to grow as a person, take care of your spirit, understand your talent, understand the behind-the-scenes of the business and the art form, know how to read your contract

and handle your money and be open to learning new languages while traveling... because the richer you are as a person, the fuller your dance experience will be."

For one night only, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater will perform in Jacksonville at the Times-Union Center's Moran Theater on Tuesday, May 18 at 7:30 pm. The Ailey dancers will be celebrating Judith Jamison's 20th year as Artistic Director with the world premiere of *Dancing Spirit*, an interpretation of Jamison's autobiography set to music by Duke Ellington, Wynton Marsalis and War. Other performances include a dynamic male solo of Robert Battle's *In/Side* to Nina Simone's "Wild is the Wind," *Night Creature*, a dedication to Duke Ellington and *Revelations*, paying homage to Mr. Ailey himself. 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sam won garden restaurant

With only two authentic restaurants, Korean cuisine is criminally under-represented and under-appreciated in Jacksonville's food scene. While it doesn't strike me as being too odd, per se, this is perhaps a bit tragic since there are some strong stylistic parallels between Korean cuisine and that of the great American barbecue with its heavy focus on meat and plethora of side dishes.

Perhaps the oversight is due to innocent ignorance, perhaps it's that these places are so hard to find. Sam Won Garden, the only Korean restaurant I've tried in the area, looks more like a strip club from the parking lot and is right next to the Duval County Tax Collectors office; definitely not some place one voluntarily travels. Even inside, the intoxicating scent of charred livestock and the tables with cooking appliances do little to dispel the suspicion that at any moment the place could erupt with an explosion of lights, debauchery and dollar bills. But in spite of the strange ambiance, an excellent meal awaits any who dare enter.

However, I must issue one warning. Beware the soju. Soju is a Korean spirit traditionally made from rice with an alcohol content that can land anywhere between 20% and 40%. It's similarity to sake and it's inherent sweetness can deceive the curious consumer and you may find yourself far more inebriated than you'd planned.

It's easy to experience a slight tinge of sticker shock when glancing at Sam Won's menu. Most of the prices really aren't that high and, when you consider the amount of food you end up with, you're actually getting quite a deal.

A great place to start is the kalbi, a meal highly recommended for any lover of good barbecued beef. Kalbi, or galbi, is a dish made with beef (or pork, but it's just beef at Sam Won) short ribs marinated in a ganging (Korean soy sauce) based sauce. It would be far too arduous a task to accurately describe how delicious this dish is but it's enough to make a borderline vegetarian question their aversion to consuming meat. The kalbi can seem a bit pricey at first but there's enough food for two and, of course, there's also the sides.

Korean cuisine is famous for its variety of side dishes. At Sam Won, the side dishes are included with the meal and can essentially be replenished until you're satisfied (come on now, let's not be too greedy). There's the traditional kimchi (pickled and fermented vegetables, usually cabbage), sprouts, various vegetables, tofu, squid and an assortment of other small offerings. While not quite the same as coleslaw, potato salad and baked beans, one can easily see the parallels drawn to American barbecue.

Another great dish to try is the Dolsot Bibimbap. The literal translation of bibimbap is mixed rice and my first encounter with this traditional Korean meal took place thousands of feet above the surface of our pleasant little planet. Although I quite enjoyed the first experience, I knew full well that airline food always pales in comparison to meals available at ground level, so I was compelled to try it again on my next visit to Sam Won.

Dolsot bibimbap is served in a VERY hot stone pot, so hot that the meal continues to cook for minutes. In addition to the rice (which is pleasantly caramelized around the edges because of the extreme heat), the dish contains beef, mushrooms, cucumber, zucchini, bean sprouts, daikon, sea weed, lettuce and some other vegetation. An egg is cracked on top and quickly fries in the heat. The flavor is complex and rich and the meal is wholly satisfying; the perfect remedy for a deep hunger.

The next time you're in the mood for barbecue I'd suggest a slight deviation towards the Korean variety. But beware, one taste of kalbi and you may never again be able to stomach American barbecue monotony.

a meal by any other name

Juliette's at the Omni by erin thursby



Downtown delis are the food of choice for most of the office workers in the area, but if you're searching for something with a bit more swank, popping inside a Downtown hotel might be the way to go. The Omni Hotel, just across from the Times-Union Center of the Performing Arts, houses Juliette's Restaurant and Bistro.

If you haven't been there in a few years, now might be the time to check it out, as they have changed the staff and management considerably. Executive Chef Greg Wright, who creates their fresh and seasonal menu, joined the team last year. He has an excellent Jacksonville resume. He's worked under Liz Grenamyer of Liz's Catering and was a chef at the old Sterlings back in the 90s.

The menu at Juliette's is best described as Southern bistro food with a French/urban twist. At lunch menu items range from \$6 to \$18, with most at about \$10. It is all about classic but fresh flavors.

Juliette's is designed in the round, a design choice they could make, because it's set in the lobby of the hotel. It strikes a chord between sleek and cozy, feeling open or private, depending on where you sit.

Though it doesn't share any of the same ingredients, I found their creamy and divine curry crab corn bisque reminiscent of a spicier version of the dal soup you can order at many Indian restaurants. The heat was more Thai than Indian, with a base of coconut milk.

They do bake bread daily, so you'll have plenty fresh crispy bread to nosh on before the rest of your food comes. It goes well with the bisque. Definitely worth dipping!

The salad selection looked scrumptious. I was torn between the chop chop salad (because of the toasted mustard vinaigrette), the walnut Gorgonzola (often a favorite of mine), the new South salad and the caprese. I finally choose the pretty caprese, a salad of layered tomato, fresh mozzarella,



baby spinach greens, basil and a sweet-tart balsamic glaze. All salads can be served regular size (\$10) or as a side salad (\$6).

Although I went with the caprese, which will be staying on the menu, that seasonal new South salad had my adventurous palate intrigued. It's set on a bed of mizuna, a type of Japanese mustard green, along with watermelon radish, sweet pickles and cherry pepper, topped with a lemon vinaigrette.

You can add chicken, salmon, shrimp, scallops or hanger steak to your salad for an extra \$6. I recommend the blackened salmon. They cook it just right, still a bit glossy in the center.

The classic fried green tomatoes are made more interesting by their companions, a crème fraiche (the French version of sour cream) blended with blue cheese and a peach compote. As a matter of personal taste, I would have rather had firmer peach pieces (perhaps with a sweet simple syrup), but such is the nature of compote. The flavors were well-balanced and overall I enjoyed this take on fried green tomatoes.

Then came dessert, a little round mound of Italian heaven. The smooth silkiness of their panna cotta was further uplifted by fresh fruit. Panna cotta is a cooked cream dessert rather like a custard, but with firmness more akin to flan.

Juliette's is an outstanding place to lunch, and with the same chef designing the dinner menu, it'd be a great spot for dinner, especially right before a show at the Performing Arts Center or the Florida Theatre.

Serve up fried chicken in honor of Mr. Cluck's, some peanut butter crackers for the Claires in your life, tray's of meat boar hunter Locke would be proud of and, of course, plenty of tropical fruit. During commercials ask trivia questions for small door prizes (stuffed polar bears, anyone?) or play a tune or two from Brooklyn-based duo Previously on *Lost* (www.myspace.com/previouslyonlostmusic).

The end of a show is often not something to celebrate. But *Lost* had an amazing run and, however you choose to watch it, the finale promises to be a satisfying one. This, my friends, is truly event television. You don't want to miss it.



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
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
